About the Author

Prof. Amarjiva Lochan was born in Gaya, the city closely associated with the Enlightenment of the Buddha. He earned his PhD in Indian–Thai acculturation from the University of Delhi, where he currently teaches in the Department of History, focusing on Asian civilizations and religions, particularly Indic elements in Southeast Asia.

He serves as Dean of Foreign Students, Director of the Centre for Global Studies, and Joint Dean of International Relations at the University of Delhi. A member of the editorial boards of five international journals, Prof. Lochan writes extensively on the syncretic nature of Southeast Asian religions, the role of *Brāhmaṇa* priests in Thailand (for which he was awarded a Ford Foundation scholarship), Hindu-Buddhist art, and the evolving forms of Buddhism. He also has a deep academic interest in the Indian diaspora.

His scholarly contributions include 13 books and 51 research articles. Widely traveled for academic engagements across the globe, Prof. Lochan is the first Asian to be elected Vice President of the International Association for the History of Religions (IAHR), affiliated with CIPSH-UNESCO. He is also a Visiting Professor at three international institutions and serves on the boards of several religious and cultural study centers in India and abroad.
